

New Udall Center for Parkinson Disease Research at Emory University By Thomas Wichmann, M.D., PhD.

In 1998, the US congress established a network of Parkinson's disease (PD) Research Centers in honor of the late senator Morris K. Udall. These centers are funded through the National Institutes of Health via a competitive grant process. Emory University was recently awarded a Udall Center, becoming one of eleven centers in this network.

Emory's center has three major goals - research, education, and public outreach. The research addresses one of the major roadblocks in the development of treatments for PD: the fact that the use of some of the most effective PD therapies remains empirical - we know that they work, but do not understand how. This is especially true for surgical treatments such as deep brain stimulation (DBS) or lesioning (pallidotomy). Thus, several of Emory's Udall Center research projects focus on assessing the consequences of such interventions on the brain. Other projects will develop and test new antiparkinsonian drugs. The center supports research conducted by scientists from several departments at both Emory University and Vanderbilt University, which encourages collaborations and the sharing of resources within the center and across the campus.

To fulfill its education mission, the center introduces young researchers to relevant topics and techniques in PD research through lectures, laboratory rotations, and small grants for PD-related research pro-

jects. The center also strives to engage the community in its efforts and has established a community advisory board that guides the center in its efforts to share its research findings and current approaches to improving PD treatment. The Emory-Udall center partners with the American Parkinson's Disease Association Information & Referral Center at Emory and the Atlanta Center for Clinical and Translational Science to reach patients, caregivers, and other interested individuals.

For decades, Emory University has been an exceptional location for PD-related research. The new Udall center represents the logical "next step' in this effort, uniting and organizing many of the varied Pd-related research, education, and outreach activities across campus.

As APDA celebrates its 50th anniversary, it continues to build upon a tradition of research support that has been responsible for major scientific breakthroughs in Parkinson's disease. Including the work of Dr. George Cotzias, which led to establishing the effectiveness of high dose oral levodopa in treating PD. Also among its funding of pioneering research were the work of Dr. Roger Duvoisin that established the roles of heredity and environment in PD, and the research that led to the discovery of alpha-Synucelin.

Among current APDA research funding are the following areas:

- Systems neuroscience research on the circuit mechanism of PD
- I DOPA-induced dyskinesia
- Mitochondrial genes in Parkinson's disease
- Risk factors for Parkinson's disease including family history
- Motor physiology and DBS studies
- Relationship between mitochondrial dysfunction and proteosomal impairment
- Measurement of radiolabeled metabolites for PET studies
- Relationship between mode of inheritance and clinical characteristics
- Development of a model for the prediction of fall risk in Parkinson's disease patients.
- Role of mechanism of dopamine agonist-induced compulsive behaviors
- Parkinson's disease neuropathology in the post-mortem cerebral cortex
- Study of platelet mtDNA mutations from PD patients and controls

APDA funding also supports:

- Clinical trials
- New lines of research to provide pilot data for future project development and pursuit of extramural funding.
- Addition of essential personnel at its Centers for Advanced Research including a movement disorders fellow, radio-chemist, data programmer, and mathematician.

If you would like to play a more active role in your own healthcare and help others by contributing to medical research, please consider volunteering for one of the research trials listed below. By becoming part of a study, you will have access to leading healthcare professionals and to potential new therapies. You will also increase your knowledge and understanding of PD and how it affects you.



RELATIVES PD PATIENTS

- Healthy control; 3-5 year observational w/MRI, Lumbar Punctures and Spect imaging.
- Generic research looking at families w/PD history; 1 time visit blood draw and PD evaluation
- ANY PD
- Orthostatic hypotension in PD pts; 14 week study
- PD pts. With cognitive impairment w/o dementia
- Overactive bladder in PD
- Survey of exposures and genetics
- EARLY PD
- Non-PD treated and not needing treamtment for at least 6 months; 3-5 year observational w/MRI, Lumbar puncture and Spect imaging
- Potentially neuroprotective medication that is currently approved for use for Diabetes. Early PD, currently treated with Eldepryl (selegiline) or Azilect (rasagiline) for between 2-8 months; on no other PD meds. 44 week study.
- New neuroprotective medication; on no other PD meds; approx. 32 weeks.
- Currently taking either Requip (ropinirole)or Mirapex (pramipexole) as only treatment for PD: 29 weeks w/ophthalmology and dermatology visits.
- FLUCTUATING PD (having "OFF" time)
- Add-on treatment to PD patients currently taking PD medications, includes diaries,
- · ophthalmology and dermatology visits.
- Surgical trial for otherwise healthy adults w/PD and having motor fluctuations(off time between doses).
- PD patients having motor fluctuations; will receive up to 16 weeks of free Apokyn (injectible dopamine agonist medication) with or without pre-treatment with Tian for nausea.


